

#### POST DOES MINI VETERANS DAY PROGRAMS AT CARE FACILITIES.

or those who were unable to attend the Post's annual Veterans Day program at the Woodland Courthouse, Post members fanned out across Woodland to bring the celebration of Veterans Day to shut-ins. Ed Trautt began the series of programs the day prior to Veterans Day at the Californian with his well-crafted speech, followed by the singing of patriotic songs.

On Nov. 11, Post 77 members performed a Veterans Day ceremony at Alderson Convalescent Hospital, including the National Anthem, a color guard, the Pledge of Allegiance and speeches. Don Campbell and Katy Marshall were the Post 77 color guard. Speaking were Vince Olvera, Katey Marshall and Carl Desendorf.

Post Executive Committee members Frank Lucchesi and Jim Webber made a return Veterans Day performance for the second year at St. John's Retirement Village. Jim and Frank presented Certificates of Appreciation for military service to all the veterans living at St. John's.

The Palm Gardens Assisted Living home had a large contingent of Post 77 members, Delbert Giese, Dan Cameron, Auxiliary Vice President Silvia Hillyer and Ted Hillyer. Delbert Geise spoke about Veterans Day and led the residents in the Pledge of Allegiance. Silvia Hillyer gave the opening prayer, followed by Ted Hillyer's presentation about how veterans

and their families should be appreciated for all their sacrifices. Ted convincingly explained that "Veterans Day is every day, as our brave men and women work to preserve our way of life 365 days a year." Next, the Post members visited Palm Gardens' "memory unit," where they conducted another ceremony, including for four World War II veterans. The Post 77 team got thanks galore from the residents, which in itself made it all worth it.

Post 77, an organization of veterans, does not forget veterans anywhere.




The keynote speaker for this year's Post 77 Veterans Day program was American Legion and VFW member Antonio Hernandez. He served three tours of duty in Iraq and is a Purple Heart recipient. Also participating in the program were Juan Hernandez, Joe Casillas, Bill Hollingshead, Ted Hillyer, and the Post 77 Rifle Squad. Second Vice Commander Juan Hernandez spoke about a veteran's view of Veterans Day: "Veterans Day provides a reminder of the nation's appreciation for those who have served in uniform. For almost 240 years, veterans have underwritten our freedom by their duty, honor and selfless service with little recognition or fanfare. As veterans we know what it is like to be standing watch far from our loved ones. We know the horror and inhumanity of combat. Thus we understand the devotion of those currently in the Armed Forces and that gives us all strength."

### WARREN MEYER'S HISTORY OF OLD SAYINGS ORIGINATING FROM THE MILITARY

"The Whole Nine Yards." American fighter planes in World War II had machine guns that were fed by a belt of cartridges. The average plane held belts that were 27 feet (9 yards) long. If the pilot used up all his ammo he was said to have given it the whole nine yards.

"Buying the Farm." This is synonymous with dying. During World War I soldiers were given life insurance policies worth \$5,000. This was about the price of an average farm. So if a soldier died he "bought the farm" for his survivors.

After the Dec. 4 City of Woodland Christmas tree lighting, the Post Auxiliary continued the spirit of Christmas going by providing hot chocolate, coffee and cookies to attendees.... With the Feb. 8 meeting of all the American Legion baseball team representatives in Area I, the work of the Post 77 Athletic Committee begins anew. We have a fine representation on the committee: Frank Eakle as chair, Val Mata, Doyle Gasperson, Steve Hedington, Frank Lucchesi, John Schaller, Jim Webber, Ron Hernandez and yours truly, Vince Olvera. It was quite good. This year, the Yolo Community Band and the Douglass Middle School Choir sang and played together, as well as separately. An additional tribute to MIAs and POWs was added. Antonio Hernandez gave a fine speech from the perspective of those who served in Iraq and Afghanistan. All in all, it was a moving experience.... Don Harper, Chair of the California American Legion Legislative Committee sent us a note about the annual meeting in Sacramento with State legislators to discuss proposed veteran-related legislation. ## 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF WORLD WAR I

his third in a series of articles continues to follow Woodland's Company F and others from Yolo County who served overseas in World War I. When members of Woodland's Company F, 2nd Regiment of the California Infantry returned from service in World War I, they helped form American Legion, Yolo Post 77 in 1919. To house Post 77, in 1922, the members purchased the Armory where Company F had trained before the war.

"Many of the F Company boys are being trained for machine gun work," the Woodland Daily Democrat reported on Dec. 4, 1917. (Dates that follow are from Daily Democrat articles unless otherwise noted.) Others from Yolo County who enlisted began to be sent to Europe in increasing numbers and they did well. Howard Dalghen, gun-pointer on the Cruiser Huntington, "was credited with the shot which sank a German undersea craft." (Dec. 10, 1917.)

Herbert Hope received the French Croix de Guerre war cross for acts of exceptional bravery. But what Hope had on his mind was that "our barracks are so cold we can't sleep, but wake up about 2:30 a.m. so stiff with cold that it's painful to move. During the day it thaws and we have mud. We stand in it, wash in it, sleep in it, and very often eat it." (Jan. 2, 1918.) Conditions were similar all over France. "I did know how many days had elapsed since I had a bath, but after keeping count for five weeks I gave up." (Sgt. H. G. Armstrong, Feb. 20, 1918.) In a letter, J.G. Morris explained another concern which if remedied would speed victory. "We can't win the war without candy." (March 28, 1918.)

Home sickness was prevalent. "It seems as though I have been gone ten years," wrote Russell Lowe of Woodland from France. (Jan. 4, 1918.) Also in France, Philip Smith expressed his feelings: "I would give two months' pay to just get one letter from you, just to hear all the news, what is happening and what did happen around Christmas time." (March 8, 1918.) Just behind the "firing line" in France, Woodlander George Zane, Jr. found a cluster of violets growing; he sent them home to his mother "so that she would know that even in the heart of the fray a bit of brightness came once in awhile." (June 1, 1918.)

Despite all the day-to-day hardship, Yolo County servicemen were enthusiastic in the fight to beat Germany. Meredith Gregory in a letter to his mother embodies that sentiment: "The people here have put up a wonderful fight and I am thankful that I am able to be here helping them with whatever I can." "Tell all my friends that I'm not coming back till we've caught and licked the Kaiser." (Clarence Fissell, June 6, 1918.) Yolo County women also showed their support for the war effort. The Red Cross in Woodland noted that "practically all of the nurses in this county have gone in the service." (Mail of Woodland, June 9, 1918.)

The fighting in France was intense. M.T. Menzies told of fighting the enemy with bayonets; "I was buried under about six inches of dirt one night by a bomb." (Sept. 13, 1918.) "At the front Fred Dieudonne succumbed after the explosion of a gas shell in his vicinity." (Sept. 17, 1918.) Dieudonne explained that "For one week after being gassed, I could not talk" and still "occasionally" my throat chokes up." (Mail of Woodland, Sept. 17, 1918).

Michael joined the Air Force in June 2013, after studying mechanical engineering at the University of Hawaii. He works as a Sensor operator, gathering intelligence and targeting with cameras and weapons on unmanned planes.

## MORE HONORS FOR VETS WHO SERVED IN KOREA DURING THE WAR, REPORTS THE CALIFORNIA AMERICAN LEGION

he government of South Korea is seeking to locate American veterans who served in Korea during the Korean War, June 25, 1950 to July 27, 1953 and those who participated in the United Nations peace-keeping operations until the end of 1955. This includes Navy service in a ship assigned in the Korean waters any time from 1950 to 1953, and nurses and those who held clerical and administrative positions in Korea.

South Korea wishes to present to those who fall into any of these categories the country's Ambassador for Peace Medal. "This is an appreciation in the form of the Korean Ambassador for Peace Medal from the Republic of South Korea for the sacrifices, service and friendship of our American service men and women who served in the Korean War," explains the Ambassador.

To obtain this medal contact the South Korea Consulate, 3500 Clay Street, San Francisco 94118, (415) 921-5946. Only a copy of your DD 214 is needed. Veterans will not have to sign anything to be awarded this medal. For deceased veterans, the next of kin may apply for the medal on behalf of the veteran.

You earned it. You should apply for the medal.

## NEW STATE LAW CAN GET VETERAN'S MISDEMEANOR CHARGE DISMISSED

f a veteran or a current member of the military is suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse, or mental health problems "as a result of his or her militray service," the person's misdemeanor can be diverted to services for treatment. After successful completion of the treatment program, the arrest "shall be deemed to have never occurred. The defendant may indicate in response to a question concerning his or her prior criminal record that he or she was not arrested...." (Penal Code section 1001.80.)

#### POST 77 ESSAY CONTESTANTS LET US KNOW WE ARE APPRECIATED

ost 77 held its annual essay contest in November. This year's topic was "Why is Veterans Day Important?" The students gave veterans great accolades in their writings. The following are parts of the winning essays.

Kendall Kiesz was enthusiastic about the celebration of Veterans Day. They stood by our country no matter what and endured harsh conditions to keep us safe. The Post 77 Color Guard and Post Chaplain Ted Hillyer opened the Yolo County Historical Society Oct. 2014 Cemetery Tour program. The program presented vignettes of Yolo County veterans' experiences in wars since the Mexican War of 1846. Included were the stories of two former Post 77 members, Margaret Nicholson and George Nakamura. Post 77 member Steve Venables played a World War I soldier buried in the Woodland Cemetery by telling the soldier's story. #### COMBAT STRESS PERSISTS LONG AFTER VIETNAM, STUDY FINDS

ost veterans who had persistent post-traumatic stress a decade or more after serving in the Vietnam War have shown surprisingly little improvement since then, and a large percentage have died, a new study finds. The study, financed by the Department of Veterans Affairs, confirms that the vast majority of veterans learn to cope with them. Yet most of those who do not - 11 percent, in the Vietnam sample - could live with traumatic stress for the remainder of their lives. More than 18 percent of those with PTSD had died by retirement age, about twice the percentage of those without the disorder. Veterans who enlisted before graduating from high school were at especially high risk of developing chronic PTSD, as were those involved in intimate, close-combat killing.
