MAJ. GENERAL WILLIAM WADE'S VETERANS DAY WORDS TO YOLO COUNTY AT THE POST 77 PROGRAM

"By keeping up in peace a 'well regulated and disciplined militia,' we shall take the fairest and best method to preserve, for a long time to come, the happiness, dignity and independence of our country. George Washington, 1783. Little did Washington know, over 200 years ago when he first penned those words, the pivotal role an all volunteer force would play in America's global war on terrorism.

On this, the 8th Veterans Day that our nation finds itself at war since the tragic events of September 11th, 2001, I would argue that we are building America's next greatest generation. People from all walks of life have stepped forward to serve their nation – creating a new generation of young veterans....

"As time and age dims the corners of our memory, it is important to shine a bright light to illuminate the accomplishments and importance of our many veterans, and remind everyone of the importance of a ready military....

"For all veterans – past and present – who know the loneliness of standing the wall and manning the ramparts of freedom so that others may bask in the warmth of their protection, I leave you with the following words.

*"I am what others don't want to be.
I go where others fear to go, and do what others fail to do.
I dread the face of terror, the stinging cold of fear, and pray

MISCELLANEOUS GOINGS-ON

On December 3rd, the Post presented a new U. S. flag to fly at the Holy Rosary School, as part of a ceremony by Post members, attended by the school's students and teachers. The school's flag had torn.... Larry Schapiro was awarded the Post's Bob Dahl Legionnaire of the Year Award.... The Post was again a location for Toys for Tots donations. The toy drive for needy children in Yolo County has been led in part over the years by Post 77 member and Past Commandant of the Yolo County Marine Corps League Frenchy Carerre.... Through member donations of \$189,000, the national American Legion has provided, in 2009, to injured and sick members of the Armed Forces, who are recovering at military hospitals and transition units, items including sweat suits, phone cards, DVDs, CDs, iPods, puzzles, books, and video games. It shows these heroes that we at the American Legion appreciate their sacrifices.... A new scout leader, Richard Engel, has taken charge of the Post 77-sponsored Boy Scout Troop 68.... The Post has donated to the construction of a veterans' memorial at the Davis Cemetery. Post member Ted Puntillo worked to make this monument a reality.... After 65 years at the bottom of Lake Michigan, a World War II-era Hellcat fighter plane was recently lifted pretty much intact out of the water. It crashed during a training exercise in January 1945. The pilot survived the crash and is now age 89.... Post 77 provides free use of the hall for the Woodland Little League Board to meet... The Post has some electronic bingo machines. You can try them out any weekday. If that is not your cup of tea, the clubroom has an old fashioned pinball machine.... While Post 77 and Post 440 in West Sacramento have voted to merge into Post 77, we are still awaiting approval from the State American Legion. The Post 440 Legion baseball team will continue.... On an on-going basis, the Post is collecting your worn or ripped flags for proper disposal under the procedures of the national American Legion.... The food donated by Post members as part of this year's Thanksgiving food drive went to the Wayfarer Center, which placed the items in baskets of food given to needy families.... "A new report from Rand Corporation suggests that teenagers in military families suffer much higher rates of emotional distress than other children. Across all age groups and genders, soldiers' children had significantly greater emotional difficulties, as measured by a series of survey questions." (Parade magazine, Dec. 20, 2009.).... In Afghanistan and Iraq, "Female soldiers are handling and dealing with stress of combat as well as male soldiers," said Col. Carl Castro, director of the Military Operational Research Program at the Department of Defense. (Sacramento Bee, Nov. 1, 2009.).... Check the date of your American Legion card. If it is not a 2010 membership card, please send in your \$33 dues. Thanks.... The Post Auxiliary members have done it again. First, they mailed boxes of items to members of the service in Iraq. Additionally, the Auxiliary bought gifts for 10 female veterans who live at the Yountville Veterans Home. Mary Cogburn drove to Yountville to deliver over 100 gifts.... One of the ways the Armed Forces deals with foreign languages overseas: West Point Professor Margaret Stock stated, "You cannot deploy globally without the contributions of immigrants [in the service]; the culture skills and language skills they contribute are integral to the success of the war effort." Looking back at 2009, I realize that thanks are in order to each of you. Without your membership, there would be no Post 77. And the support to the community and to veterans by American Legion Post 77 during this last year could not have happened.

Let's look back at 2009. Through the Veterans Day dinner receipts, we were able to donate \$500 to buy wreaths to place on the grave sites of veterans at the national cemetery in Dixon. Our Veterans Day and Memorial Day programs were well attended; the Post receives many compliments about our continuing these patriotic traditions. The significantly upgraded veterans' monument in the Woodland Cemetery, spear-headed by the Legion, under the direction of Corbin Smith, looks great, including the spot light shining upon our country's flag throughout the nights. And Post 77 reminds the community of the sacrifices you have made on behalf of the United States of America.

The tradition continued in 2009 of ★Girls and Boys State, ★high school scholarships, ★awards to ROTC cadets, ★Legion local children's baseball, ★law enforcement officers and firefighters awards, ★taking part in veterans' funerals, ★American Legion student awards, ★color guards for community events, ★putting up flags on Main St., Woodland on patriotic holidays, ★raising the flag at every Woodland and Pioneer high schools' home football game, ★sending phone cards and other items to those stationed in Iraq and Afghanistan, ★an annual award to a business that flies the American flag 24 hours a day, ★a program at Woodland High School of having veterans speak to the students, ★sponsoring Boy Scout Troop 68, and ★honoring those who have died in war by our participation in the funeral service. This year we were able to add ★a high school essay contest on a patriotic subject, ★cooking meals for the homeless, ★re-painting the Civil War unknown soldiers' memorial in the Woodland Cemetery, ★collecting food for the poor, and ★sending a local student to an American Legion forestry conference.

As a consequence, Post 77 received the City of Woodland's highest achievement award, awards for best in the State from the American Legion, and a California Assembly resolution commending the members of Post 77 on their accomplishments over the last 90 years.

In addition, the State and National Legion have donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to help veterans, members of the Armed Forces who have been injured, children, and for many more good causes.

I'd say we have closed out this decade on a high note.

WOODLAND - LIFE ON THE WORLD WAR II HOMEFRONT



The new Sanitary Dairy opened in April of 1941 with a fleet of three home delivery milk trucks. Originally near the Corner Drug on Main Street, Woodland, the dairy moved to its new location on 6th and Lincoln Streets.

The United States officially declared war after the December 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor, however the draft had already begun in 1940. Patriotism was running high on the Homefront and the Hollingshead brothers, Edward standing and Billy on the seat, are ready for a Patriotic Decorated Bicycle Parade on Sept. 22, 1940.

POST 77 ESSAY CONTEST RESULTS FIND THAT MANY STUDENTS UNDERSTAND THE MEANING OF VETERANS DAY

Do Woodland High School students know the meaning of Veterans Day? Yes, they do. From reading the essays written in response to Post 77's essay contest, the high school students conveyed their strong feelings about the importance of the sacrifices made by veterans. The Post 77 essay topic was "Why should Veterans Day be important to Americans?"

First place in the essay contest, which included prize money for all four winners, was Kayla Marks who wrote: "Veterans Day reminds us what America stands for and why we love this country so much, our freedom and liberties."

The second place essay, by David Bristow explains about veterans: "Without those heroes, life as we know it would be so much different, and most likely without all the freedoms we enjoy. Veterans have given us democracy, freedom, strength, and above all else, veterans have given us a sense of dignity in the sanctuary that is the United States of America." David plans to join the Armed Forces after graduation from Woodland High School.

Third place winner Jordan De Knikker knows from the generations of his family who served that "These brave men and women have traveled to far off places to fight and defend America. Veterans Day should be a hallowed day of solemn remembrance." Jordan has already joined the Navy for an enlistment to start after high school graduation in May.

Kayla Pitto provides what should always be the objective of Veterans Day observances: "November 11th is the day we make sure that the veterans know that we appreciate the sacrifices they have made to keep our country free." "Veterans Day should be important to Americans because veterans risked their lives for us, made our country what it is today and provided freedom to us all," Brandon De Anda wrote.

Many would no doubt agree with the beautiful thought of Monica Saldano that "Veterans Day can be compared to a thank you letter." Lauren Rodriguez recommends on Veterans Day "going to a veterans' memorial or simply taking a moment to think about veterans and treasure the sacrifices they made for our country."

About Armed Forces veterans, the students wrote most passionately. "Not knowing if they would return to their families, veterans risked everything to serve their beloved country." (Michella Hjersman) "For those who put their lives at risk, those who dodged bullets, and walked through minefields, they will always be remembered." (Leonela Hernandez) "They would rather die than let a foreign enemy take the freedom of millions of Americans." (Robert Morrison) "Some veterans missed seeing their children grow up. This sacrifice they made for us." (Brandy Davis) "I'm thankful for the men and women who have fought for my safety and freedom." (Kyle Deever)

How can veterans feel other than their service was important when hearing the words of Woodland High School student Viridiana Ambriz? "Veterans should and will always be remembered for their courage, sacrifice and the love of their country. Veterans are true heroes of America and never shall they be forgotten."

MEMORIES OF YOLO COUNTY MIAs STILL BRINGS SADNESS

Each year, at Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies in Yolo County, we pay humble tribute to America's missing in action. Nationally, a special recognition day for MIAs is annually the third Friday in September.

At Post 77 and other American Legion Posts throughout the United States, a POW/MIA empty chair sits at all membership meetings as a physical symbol of the thousands of American POW/MIAs still unaccounted for from all wars and conflicts. At each Post 77 dinner and other events, a small table occupies a place of honor, symbolizing that members of our Armed Forces are still missing from our ranks.

MIAs remain our comrades. Some from Yolo County are:

First Lt. Frank Frazier of Davis served during World War II in the 530th Army Corps Fighting Squadron. Kristina Maggi, Head Researcher for the Yolo County Veterans Memorial Project, provided information about Lt. Frazier that he went missing in action during March 1945 in the Philippines. He was 34. He is honored at the Fort McKinley Monument at Manila, Philippines. Approximately 78,750 of our World War II servicemen are still listed as missing in action.

Albert Estrada of Woodland is an MIA from the Korean War. A good looking guy, Estrada at Woodland High was an athlete and a sharp dresser whom high school girls liked. In North Korea, on November 27, 1950, Corporal Estrada's unit was surprised by a

massive Chinese communist attack. After six days of fierce fighting, including hand-to-hand combat, he was one of 385 from the original 2,500 troops who were still able to fight. Four days later, the Chinese communist army resumed its attack. Corporal Estrada and the others fought the enemy off for two more days. On December 7, 1950, at age 18, during the midst of a vicious battlefield fight, Albert Estrada was never heard from again.

PFC Luis Mercado of Yolo became missing in action in the Korean War during his participation in the battle of Porkchop Hill, an area that is now part of the Demilitarized Zone. On July 6, 1953, just before midnight, following a very intensive artillery barrage, the Chinese army attacked with two battalions. PFC Mercado's regiment, the 17th Infantry Division, launched a counterattack. The enemy rained down artillery and mortar fire at the rate of one round per second. Luis Mercado fought valiantly but was last seen alive on July 8, 1953.

With lack of support from the North Korean dictatorship, Estrada, Mercado and approximately 8,138 others still remain missing in action.

There are 1,731 MIA's from the war in Vietnam. When including both MIAs and those who were missing but later declared dead, 1,960 were in the Army, 1,130 Air Force, 325 from the Navy and 108 Marines. One of those still missing in action is Staff Sgt. William Shinn of Woodland. On January 28, 1970, after two U.S. F105F jet pilots were downed, Shinn flew in an HH-53B on a search and rescue mission into North Vietnam. When his aircraft was about 50 miles from the F105F crash site, it was hit by an air to air missile fired from a MIG-21. There was one two second beep from SSgt. Shinn's aircraft after the explosion, indicating that at least one person aboard may have exited the aircraft. William Shinn's whereabouts are still unknown.

During and after the Vietnam War, citizens from around the country wore POW bracelets. John Schneider of Scotia, New York wore a POW bracelet with the name "William Shinn, USAF" for almost 40 years, until his death in 2009. Schneider asked to be laid to rest in the Gerald Solomon National Cemetery in New York with only his military dog tags and that POW bracelet.

The body of Davis resident Wayne Reinecke was not found after the SH3A helicopter he was on crashed in the Gulf of Tonkin, off of North Vietnam, on Jan. 12, 1967. Wayne Reinecke was an Aviation Antisubmarine Warfare Technician 3rd Class serving on the U.S.S. Bennington. Wayne's uncle wrote the Post saying: "Wayne enjoyed his military duty. He was a normal, clean cut kid who was always ready to pitch in."

These MIAs from Yolo County are still missing. For their families and those of other MIAs, life goes on in agonizing suspense.

VETERANS BENEFIT FOR NURSING HOME AND IN-HOME CARE

“Aid and Attendance” is a special monthly pension benefit offered by the Veterans Administration for veterans and surviving spouses who require in-home care or live-in nursing homes. For a veteran or surviving spouse to qualify, the veteran must have served at least 90 days of active military duty, one day of which is during a period of war.

The veteran’s benefit is \$18,234 annually (paid monthly) and increases to \$21,615 if the veteran has a dependent. The surviving spouse alone is entitled to \$11,715 annually.

The Yolo County Veterans Service Office, at (530) 406-4850, will help you prepare an application to the Veterans Administration.

Frenchy Carerre re-joined the American Legion. He had 900 hours in B-26s as part of the 3rd Marine Air Wing, 1943-46.
